Shuttle Time Report 2021

The first half of the year was a busy one for Shuttle Time in schools. Coming into the new year after a severely COVID affected 2020 schools were very keen to engage students in sport in support of their general wellbeing. We had a record first 6 months in terms of numbers with Badminton NZ praising our efforts as the 3rd best association nationally up to that point. Lockdown came again during early

Term 3 at our busiest point of the year and saw a definite change in mood from schools and teachers with engagement becoming much harder as the end of year beckoned. On a more positive note post lockdown we were still able to engage for the first time in 2 years with Monrad intermediate – a key school for us. Locally around Palmerston North it was great to be able to engage with several new groups of students this year including Freyberg High Active Teens & Teen Parent Unit, Te Aroha Noa, Highbury Whanau Centre, Y-Central (formerly YMCA) and Parkland School. Around the region we expanded into new schools in Dannevirke, Levin and Pahiatua as well as coordinating with David Wasley to deliver to a cluster of 5 schools in Oroua.

Clubs, Schools and Events

Affiliated Clubs

Not all clubs have returned players numbers to MBA, making it difficult to draw any trends or conclusions on numbers. COVID continued to hit the clubs hard as some did not have the structure to carry out all the government requirements to open in certain levels, and some others lost their venues under various Alert Levels. MBA decided to absorb the club portion of affiliation fees and as a result there was no fees charged to the clubs in 2021. Congrats to the clubs for surviving another challenging year. 2022 is sure to bring more disruption to play as we navigate COVID but we will do our best to provide safe playing opportunities for our community.

MBA continues to administer the Central Regions Badminton programme and generally deals with Junior Events. James is the co-ordinator, and the role is funded by 10 associations and Badminton NZ.







Sanctioned Events

COVID-19 was a major influence on the local and regional tournament calendar once again in 2021. We were fortunate as we were able to successfully run the NI/MAN u13 Champs, MAN u17 Open and CR Team Finals before the mid-August lockdown. However, this lockdown did result in the cancellation of our major senior sanctioned tournament, the Manawatu Open. It was decided to run an unsanctioned Manawatu ABCD Champs instead, which was scheduled to take place in November, outside of the traditional season.

Both u13 & u17 tournaments were very well attended, particularly by players from outside the Manawatu, who made up most participants. These were scheduled just 4 weeks before the National Team Comp in July, plus in conjunction with the u13 & u17 CR Team Finals on the Sunday. Coupled with the professional event delivery established at our events, this timing helped to maintain a strong non-Manawatu attendance.

The Manawatu ABCD Champs turned out to be very successful in terms of player entries, with a high demand for this type of unsanctioned graded competition from within our region as well as players willing to travel to Palmerston North, despite the scheduling of this event outside of the normal season. Of the 20 events advertised, 16 were ultimately run, which is fantastic. Based on this success, we plan to run similar graded events in the future.

We would like to say a big thank you to Sport Manawatu and the Palmerston North City Council for their investment, assisting us to continue to deliver quality local events that attract participants from all over New Zealand.











School Competitions

It was another full and successful year for school competition participation, offering a structured and social opportunity for school aged players to continue playing outside of school. The in-school and after-school Shuttle Time programme helps to generate interest in playing badminton, strengthening the pathway within primary and intermediate schools into our school competitions. Despite the ongoing pandemic, we hit record numbers in three out of four of our school competitions in 2021, as well as reaching our maximum capacity for a new secondary school 'Youth League' run during Term 3.

The new competition was an entirely novel format with boys & girls playing on the same team, more like representative badminton. We decided to emphasis the fact badminton is a mixed team sport, whereas many other sports are not, with boys & girls rarely having the chance to play sport together once in high school. The format received very positive feedback from schools, sport coordinators and the participants themselves. We hoped to run the same event again in 2022, but the availability of Arena has prevented this. Therefore, as a compromise in 2022, we are introducing singles into the Secondary school competition and extending this competition into the available dates in Term 3 to secure the time slot. In future years, we will look at how the competition can be adapted to offer a mixed team experience once again.

The format of the term 1 & term 4 competitions was aligned to allow intermediate schools to enter teams into both competitions at the same time, as well as help the participants to become familiar with the playing format of the competition. Team players each play 1x singles & 2x doubles per tie, having 2 or 3 ties per week. With singles included in the Youth League, we are now able to offer competition singles & doubles to all school aged players.

Thursday Night Badminton League

As usual, TNBL ran for the entire year and despite two COVID-19 scares, we managed to complete seven rounds in total. However, this was only possible given the host of large event cancellations, which meant the Arena was available for several extra weeks that we would not normally expect to have. Therefore, 2021 represented a relatively average year in terms of number of TNBL weeks. The trend of fewer available weeks due to the increasing number of large events being held at Arena is continuing and we expect to have fewer weeks of TNBL in 2022, even without any COVID-19 disruption.

Over the year a total of 320 unique participants played for the 49 teams over a period of 37 playing weeks. A total of 536 ties were played, consisting of 3216 matches and 7020 games. TNBL was just short of 250,000 points being played!!

Para Badminton Report 2021



Oliver Linton continued to train regularly with myself here in Palmerston North and as a part of the New Zealand Para Badminton Tier 1 group. Early in the year we attended a Badminton NZ Para training camp in Hamilton, Oliver as a participant and me as one of the coaches. It was great to mix with the other athletes of different classes both for myself as a coach and Oliver as a player. A series of "standing" camps were also planned by badminton NZ throughout the year to culminate in a Para Invitational Cup (international) in Christchurch. We managed to attend the first "standing" camp in May over in Napier. Again, it was great to come together with the

other para athletes for Oliver to have the sparring and matches that he rarely got in Palmerston North. Subsequent "standing" camps unfortunately did not go ahead due to Covid-19. I was also invited to coach some workshops with the competitors prior to the Invitational Cup but it was also first postponed and then cancelled due to Covid-19.



It was a big shock in September when we got the news that Oliver was in ICU at Palmerston North Hospital with a large mass in his chest. It turned out to be Hodgkin's Lymphoma (a form of cancer, although a relatively more treatable one). Oliver is now unable to play badminton and fighting the cancer with medication and chemo. Although struggling from the pain of the disease and side effects of the medication Oliver continues to show his strength of character as he fights on. Even to the point of having a friendly bet amongst his family as to when his hair would fall out. The future is uncertain, but we wish him the best and hope for a full recovery enough that he may play badminton again.

FUNDRAISING

We continued to fundraise and apply for funding in 2021. Our Racket stringing service continues to create income for the association with particular thanks to our stringer Richard Skarott.

The professionalism and quality of our competitions and reps also attracts schools players and players from the wider community. Schools competitions have increased year on year even through COVID times showing us that the tamariki and rangatahi have an appetite to participate in this sport.

Thursday Night Badminton League continues to be our biggest revenue earner, again thanks to Richard for administering this every Thursday. The income from our other competitions (day-events and schools competitions) also assists with funding our association.

Yonex rackets and grips were also available to buy from the MBA and this provides us with some extra income for our activities.

Lastly, a the biggest thank you must go to all our stakeholders the volunteers, coaches, managers, clubs, committee/Board members and players who enable us to deliver badminton to the community and keep coming back for more!
