- ✓ Central Regional teams Manawatu had by far the most in any CR association with 12 teams taking part. Amazing effort especially when we had some COVID disruptions to coaches and players in first half of season.
- ✓ NZ Junior Teams Champs in July school holidays and we had 7 teams.
- ✓ Sabella Chen reaching NZ National ranking of No.1 in singles, doubles and mixed doubles
- ✓ U15 and U19 squad group going to Hawkes Bay
- ✓ Proud of all Manawatu players that played in NZ Nationals

MBA selected five teams to represent Manawatu in 2022. Two in Senior Div, 1 Masters, 1 Vets and 1 Super-vets. We started the season with trials and got together a number of selectors for the different age groups. The I-A ties kicked off in April and ended in September. We have also bid farewell and Bon Voyage to one of our longest standing Manawatu Rep Players, Simon Allan - Thanks for your sportsmanship, questionable serving and all the memories!

Clubs, Schools and Events

Affiliated Clubs

Not all clubs have returned players numbers to MBA, making it difficult to draw any trends or conclusions on numbers. COVID continued to impact the clubs as some others lost their venues under various Alert Levels. MBA decided to absorb the club portion of affiliation fees and as a result there was no fees charged to the clubs in 2022. Congrats to the Masters clubs, PN Badminton Club, Rainbow Club and Massey United Manawatu Badminton Club for surviving another challenging year. 2023 is sure to bring more disruption to play as we navigate COVID but we will do our best to provide safe playing opportunities for our community.



Competitions and Sanctioned Events

Manawatu ABCD Champs 2022 was the largest individual tournament run by Badminton Manawatu (excluding hosting national events). We ran 18 events with 126 entries over the two days. The high participation in the Manawatu ABCD Champs vindicates the decision to run the event once again. Additionally, the high (and growing) participation numbers year-on-year demonstrates the demand for the event.

The Manawatu Senior and U13 Open 2022 saw around 75% of participants not from Palmerston North, which is higher than in previous years. U13s ran 7 events and had 28 entries and the Senior Open ran 8 events with 49 entries. If local player entries were not abnormally low for this tournament, then this could have been the biggest sanctioned tournament run in the Manawatu. This event was run during a time of COVID resurgence in March 2022.

A new event that we were asked to manage was the Pistang Pilipino 2022 held on Labour weekend in Palmerston North; hosted by the Philippine Central Association, Inc. It has been especially designed to be a fun-filled three-day celebration from October 21 to 23. There were 12 events played with over 100 players from around NZ taking part. Great atmosphere and great fun had by all!





MBA continues to administer the Central Regions Badminton programme and generally deals with Junior Events. James is the co-ordinator, and the role is funded by 10 associations, Badminton NZ and NZCT has provided some funding in 2022. Localised and Regional junior team comps make up the bulk of the logistical work during the season. Junior Development and Coach Development has been prioritised also in 2022 with camps run throughout the region. James offers a level of professionalism to the CR group and ensures open communication and updated information for the associations.

The in-school and after-school Shuttle Time programme helps to generate interest in playing badminton, strengthening the pathway within primary and intermediate schools into our school competitions.

TNBL ran for the entire year, we managed to complete a whooping 9 rounds in total. However, this was only possible with the help and assistance from the Arena as it became available for several extra weeks that we would not normally expect to have. This year saw an increase in the social grades with many new family and school teams taking part. The age range goes from 7 years old to 75 years old and we continue to provide an event that caters for everyone in the rohe, no matter what age or ability. Thanks to our main volunteer Richard Skarott for his time and reporting skills, and those that step in when required.



FUNDRAISING

We continued to fundraise and apply for funding in 2022. Thursday Night Badminton League continues to be our biggest revenue earner, again thanks to James for managing this and Richard for volunteering every Thursday. The income from our other competitions (day-events and schools competitions) also assists with funding the operations of our association.

Our Racket stringing service continues to create income for the association with particular thanks to our stringer Richard Skarott.

The professionalism and quality of our competitions also attracts schools players and players from the wider community. School's competitions have increased year on year even through COVID times showing us that the tamariki and rangatahi have an appetite to participate in this sport. Entry fees for these tournaments assists the association to continue to develop our sport.

Yonex rackets and grips were also available to buy from the MBA and this provides us with some extra income for our activities. Shuttles are also available to purchase.



A new fundraiser that was offered to us in October was to sell Christmas Trees in association with Turflands/MBA coach Gary Teague. We allocated the fundraising efforts to the representative programme and planned a volunteer roster with all available rep players and/or their families. A huge effort throughout November and December proved highly successful and a whole lot of fun! Norwood kindly provided us with a venue on Tremaine Avenue and Turflands set up the venue to sell sell sell! This fundraiser raised over \$10,000 towards representative costs and over \$3,000 towards junior development coaching camps in 2023. Thanks to everyone for being involved especially at the farm and to all those that purchased a tree from us!
